


Diversity in Youth Literature: Opening Doors Through Reading (2013) edited by

This contributed volume provides guidelines for selecting diverse youth literature and suggestions for programs and strategies to promote multicultural literature in library and classroom environments.




Multicultural Children's Literature: Through the Eyes of Many Children (2009) by



<u>Children's Literature in the Reading Program: Engaging Young Readers in the 21st</u> <u>Century</u> (2018) edited by Deborah A. Wooten, Lauren Aimonette Lang, Bernice E. Cullinan; foreword by Richard L. Allington

This educational resource discusses how to incorporate outstanding children's literature in K-8 classrooms, with several chapters focused on diverse and multicultural literature.



<u>Critical Multicultural Analysis of Children's Literature: Mirrors, Windows, and Doors</u> (2009) by Maria José Botelho and Masha Kabakow Rudman

This book prepares teachers, educators, and researchers on how to analyze the ideological elements of reading and studying multicultural literature. Each chapter includes suggestions for classroom application and further reading.



<u>Multiracial Identity in Children's Literature: Reading Diversity in the Classroom</u> (2017) by Amina Chaudhri

This book consists of a critical analysis of contemporary children's fiction, including current and historical discourse on how multiracial experiences are portrayed and reflected through images and text. Includes a chapter on teaching and learning utilizing multiracial children's fiction.



<u>Multicultural Children's Literature: A Critical Issues Approach</u> (2011) by Ambika Gopalakrishnan with contributions by Kimberly Persiani-Becker

This comprehensive text helps K-12 teachers use multicultural literature in the classroom to focus on critical social issues. Each chapter includes sample lessons plans and an annotated bibliography for selecting appropriate multicultural books.

Teaching Multicultural Literature: A Workshop for the Middle Grades

This free multicultural literature workshop from Annenberg Learner introduces middle school educators to ethnically diverse American writers and offers dynamic instructional methods. It includes eight one-hour video programs and an online workshop guide.

Ted Talk: The Danger of a Single Story (2009)

Novelist Chimamanda Adichie presents discusses how she discovered her authentic voice and addresses the importance of stories with various cultural perspectives. She warns of the critical misunderstandings that can arise from only being presented with a single narrative.

ERIC (EBSCO)

Useful database for conducting research in the field of education. Includes information from journals, magazines, books, conferences, and governmental agencies.

International Children's Digital Library

This is an open access collection of digital children's books from around the world. The collection includes over 4,500 books in 59 different languages.

International Journal of Multicultural Education

This is an open access journal dedicated to promoting cross-cultural understanding and educational equity in all levels of education.

Library Literature and Information Science Full Text

This database indexes library and information science journals, books, chapters within books, conference proceedings, selected state journals, library school theses, and pamphlets.

MultiCultural Review

This journal includes articles on minority experiences, curriculum design, collection development, and practical ideas for educators and librarians.
